The Wyoming Donated Dental Services (DDS) program helps patients like Mary Jo, 69, who lives in Laramie. Mary Jo has heart disease as well as serious breathing problems. In 2010, she was exposed to mold at her workplace and developed a severe lung infection. Even after undergoing a partial lung removal, she continues to have trouble breathing. Sadly, her dental health was another challenge: she was missing several teeth and those remaining were badly decayed. Unfortunately, Mary Jo was unable to afford the dental treatment she needed. She survives on food assistance and a Social Security benefit and her fixed income barely covers her monthly living expenses. She visited a local dental school but could not afford the extensive treatment she needed. Dental treatment seemed far beyond her reach.

#### **HOW DDS HELPED**

This all changed when a team of DDS volunteers came to Mary Jo's aid. Dr. Byron Killpack extracted her remaining teeth and partnered with Elevated Dental Arts to donate full upper and lower dentures. Thanks to these caring volunteers, Mary Jo received thousands in donated treatment that restored her dental health!
